Flu immunizations will be offered at Parent-Teacher Interviews

Flu season is fast approaching and everyone is encouraged to get their flu immunization early. Starting October 14, free flu immunizations are available for everyone six months old and older.

This year, Public Health Services in Prairie North Health Region is offering flu immunizations during some Parent-Teacher Interview evenings at select schools. During these evenings at the schools, parents, students, and teachers will be able to be immunized against influenza by public health nurses.

Children and youth between 2-years and 17-years of age can get the flu immunization without having to have a needle. The **nasal spray vaccine FluMist®** is available for them.*

*Please note: This nasal spray option is available for most children. Due to some contraindications, some children may not be eligible to receive it. Children who cannot receive FluMist® may be able to receive injectable flu immunization.

What is FluMist®?

FluMist® is available and recommended for most children aged 2-years to 17-years-old. FluMist® is a live, weakened influenza vaccine that is sprayed into both nostrils. Children younger than 9 years old need two doses four weeks apart if this is their first time getting an influenza vaccine. It is much safer to get FluMist® than to get influenza disease.

What is influenza and why is it important to be immunized against it?

Influenza is a disease caused by influenza viruses which are easily spread through coughing, sneezing and direct contact with nose and throat secretions. Influenza can lead to hospitalization and death, especially in very young children, the elderly, and those with serious health conditions. Infected people can spread the virus to others before any symptoms appear. Getting immunized every year protects you and those around you from influenza. You cannot get influenza from any of the influenza vaccines. Everyone 6-months-old and over can get a free flu immunization.

Please contact your school or visit your school website for information on when flu immunizations will be available during Parent-Teacher Interview evenings. If you are unable to attend the special flu immunization opportunity at your school, you and your family members are encouraged to attend any of our public influenza immunization clinics to receive your vaccination.

* Please note: this nasal spray option is available for most children. Due to some contraindications, certain children may not be eligible to receive it. Children who cannot receive FluMist® may receive injectable flu immunization, available at our public clinics.
